To achieve this, he sourced cocoa directly from farmers, paid fair wages, ensured transparency, and rejected the industry's exploitative practices. Every decision, from production to branding, was shaped by purpose. This conviction even shaped the brand's visual identity: the chocolate bars were designed with deliberately uneven chunks, a bold symbol of the inequality in the cocoa trade. In this way, the product itself became a voice, a tangible, edible declaration that business could be both profitable and just.

When you anchor your enterprise in a mission that transcends self-interest, you do more than sell a product; you champion a cause, empower people, and reshape an industry. Let this be your blueprint. Don't just build a business; **build a better world.**

Never commit the sin of giving up on yourself. Rehoboth is what you enter after you have endured contention, tried again after failure, and refused to let resistance define you. When one well fails, dig again. When opposition comes, keep moving. There is a place where striving ends because God Himself makes room. Your Rehoboth is waiting: the spacious place where striving ends, because God Himself has made room for you.

Do not stop digging. Do not be discouraged by opposition. Your Rehoboth is ahead. If you remain faithful and persistent, God will bring you into a place of expansion and fruitfulness.
